In its second year, the contest yielded over 800 images, with more than 60 of them receiving recognition. The pictures range from stunning shots of the Dallas skyline to the rare sight of coyotes howling in a snow bank.

to see their city captured in beautiful photographs taken by their peers. About the Trinity River Corridor Project:

With a combined investment of over \$2 billion from all interagency partners, public and private sources; the Trinity River Corridor Project is the largest and most complex public works and urban development project undertaken by the City of Dallas. This project is first and foremost a flood protection solution and one of the largest of its type in the nation. The project consists of five major components: flood protection, transportation, recreation, environment, and business development. The Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge, designed by internationally known architect Santiago Calatrava, is under construction and will open in 2012. A second Calatrava designed bridge, the Margaret McDermott Bridge (IH-30), is planned for a later date.



TRINITY FOREST

The Trinity River Audubon Center (TRAC), a flagship location for the Texas Audubon Society, is a beautiful teaching and recreation site in the Great Trinity Forest. The Dallas Wave kayak area opens in the fall of 2011 along with the Santa Fe Trestle Hike and Bike Trail and more than 12 miles of new trails have been completed along with the 75-acre Lower Chain of Wetlands which assists with flood protection upstream of the river by as much as one foot in heavy rains.
